Over 150 years later black history finally begins to be acknowledged

Honoring the first winner of the Kentucky Derby Oliver Lewis

Last Wednesday June 24th 2026, after more than 150 years later, Oliver Lewis, the very first winner of the Kentucky Derby was finally acknowledged through a statue commemoration held at Churchill Downs.

Oliver Lewis led a chestnut colt thoroughbred named Aristides to the finish line of the inaugural Kentucky Derby on May 17, 1875, with over 10,000 spectators. Trained by formally enslaved Angel Williamson, Aristides went on to win 8 additional Derby races.

Black jockeys and trainers dominated the scene so much during this time that 15 of the first 28 Kentucky Derby races were won by pioneers such as William "Billy" Walker (1877), Issac Burns Murphy, who was the first ever to achieve back to back wins with a total of 3 (1884, 1890, 1891) and the youngest jockey in history, 15 year old Alonzo "Lonnie" Clayton (1892) who tied with James "Soup" Perkins at the age of 15 (1895).

Oliver Lewis is just the beginning of the black narrative that needs to be acknowledged at the Kentucky Derby showcasing the endurance, skill and harsh reality that African Americans had to face while creating the foundation and being the backbone to one of the most highly anticipated sporting events in history.

During the 18th century and early 19th century at the start of Jim Crow black jockeys who paved the way were subject to harsh racially provoked treatment in an attempt to be pushed out of the sport such as crowding to prevent movement on the track, violence, being forced off the track and even death threats.

The Kentucky Derby is still predominantly white to this day with a large amount of black generational Louisville natives never even or



interested in experiencing the Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs because of lack of inclusion. Just two years ago during the 150th Kentucky Derby in 2024, Tina Knowles, the mother of (cont. pg. 2)

(cont. from pg. 1) Beyoncé, the most iconic entertainer of our time, was just disrespected during the announcement of her walk on to the red carpet when an employee interrupted by stepping in front of her to allow a white couple to cut the line instead. She later stated in the Peacock documentary High Horse: The Black Cowboy that it gave her a “wake up call” and the event had “racially charged energy”.

With that being said we do hope that Churchill Downs does continue to unfold and show appreciation for the black lives that created the structure that developed the Kentucky Derby. Maybe we’ll soon see more acknowledgement about the very ticket we still use today for the event which was also designed and created by Oliver Lewis, mentioned by family members during the commemoration.

As of now we will enjoy the statue and history of Oliver Lewis, the first Kentucky Derby winner located at the First Turn Club entrance which is said to be moved to a garden honoring Derby pioneers in a more visible location in the next two years. We’ll be sure to look out for that transition and anticipate more acknowledgement of untold black history.

Reminder: Withholding and Sales & Use Tax July Due Dates



Don't forget to log in to [MyTaxes](#), the new business taxpayer portal, to review and update your demographic information, make payments, file returns, and submit refund applications.

Taxes that should be paid in the Portal include Sales & Use, Corporation Income (Corp)/Limited Liability Entity (LLE), Telecom, Withholding, Utility Gross Receipts License (UGRLT), Non-Resident Withholding (NRWH), Commercial Mobile Radio Service (CMRS), Tire, and Transient.

The following due dates are coming in July:

- July 10th - Twice-Monthly Income Tax Withholding Return
- July 15th - Monthly Income Tax Withholding Return
- July 20th - Monthly & Quarterly Regular Sales & Use, Telecom, UGRLT, CMRS, Tire, and Transient
- July 27th - Accelerated Sales & Use, Twice-Monthly Income Tax Withholding Return
- July 31st - Quarterly Income Tax Withholding Return

When a return due date falls on a scheduled holiday or weekend, returns will be due the next working day. Visit [MyTaxes](#) for filing information, due dates, viewing your account information, and filing a return. You can also view [Frequently Asked Questions](#), with accompanying video walk-throughs, for fast and easy assistance with logging in, filing returns, and making payments.

Metro United Way is excited to announce the Youth Social Action Project Mini-grant funding opportunity to support youth-serving organizations in engaging young people to create projects that effect positive change in our community.

To qualify for YSAP, your organization must:

- Be a 501(c)(3) organization or fiscally sponsored by one.
- Serve young people in one or more of Metro United Way's seven county service regions: Harrison, Clark & Floyd Counties in Indiana and Jefferson, Bullitt, Oldham & Shelby Counties in Kentucky.
- Be a youth-serving organization working with young people between the ages of 10 and 24 years.

To apply, you must request login credentials through the Metro United Way Grant portal: [Credential Registration Portal HERE](#)

You will receive the credentials on July 1 or within 1 business day after you complete your request, when the application opens.

A successful grant application will clearly describe how your organization plans to engage youth in project-based learning supported by your staff and/or volunteers to research, plan, and implement a social action project. Any organization/agency that works with/serves youth ages 12-24 can apply for up to \$5,000 in funding to support a youth social action project in partnership with youth within their respective agency/organization/community. Applications should demonstrate your ability to ensure equity within youth-adult partnerships, how youth are involved in designing the project, and a clear intent to ignite positive agency and organizational or community change.

Once applications are submitted, there will be a two-step review process. The first stage will be an adult review of all submitted applications to ensure they meet the minimum requirements of youth/adult partnership and social action project-based activity proposed in the application. Applications that meet these requirements will then be reviewed by young people who will score and make the final funding recommendations. Based on their recommendations and feedback from our Community Impact Cabinet, agencies will be selected to receive funding. Only one application per organization will be accepted. The grant review committee will include representatives from Metro United Way, The Book Works staff and a diverse group of young people who will be trained and supported by staff from the Book Works and Metro United Way.



To qualify for YSAP, your organization must:

- Be a youth-serving organization working with Young People within the 12 - 24 age range in our service region.
- Be a 501(c)(3) charitable organization or fiscally sponsored by one.
- Attach a copy of your IRS determination letter or one from the sponsoring 501(c)(3) organization with a letter stating their willingness to be the fiscal sponsor.
- Provide services within Metro United Way's Seven County Service Area: Harrison, Floyd and Clark Counties in Indiana and Jefferson, Bullitt, Oldham and Shelby Counties in Kentucky.

Funding Amount: Up to \$5,000 **Project Period:** September 2026 through June 2027

Allowable Expenses:

- Food/supplies to support project-planning meetings with youth
- Youth stipends: Metro United Way strongly encourages compensating youth for their time, leadership, and expertise whenever possible.
- Direct project costs (NOTE: no more than 50% of funds can be used for staff personnel costs)

Expectations of Funded Organizations

If your organization receives the grant, you are expected to:

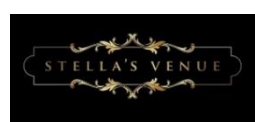
- At least one representative from your organization must be present at the YSAP Kick-Off meeting.
- Your organization must be responsive to communication and available to schedule check-ins with the Youth Success Team.
- Must submit a project plan to the Youth Success Team before completing your project.
- Must complete a final report by June 30, 2027.

Lemony Kale with Toasted Almonds

Serves: 2-3 Est. cost: \$2.44 Est. cost per serving: \$1.22

Ingredients:

- 2 tbsp sliced almonds, raw and unsalted
- 1 tsp extra virgin olive oil
- 1 bunch curly kale, de-stemmed and roughly chopped
- 1 pinch sea salt
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 tbsp fresh lemon juice
- 1/2 tbsp coconut aminos (or reduced sodium soy sauce)

Equipment: Cutting board, knife, small skillet, large sauté pan, spoon

Directions:

1. In a small pan, dry toast almonds over low heat for 2-3 minutes. (Continuously shake the pan until almonds become aromatic and not burnt).
2. Remove from heat and set aside.
3. In a large sauté pan, heat oil over medium heat.
4. Add kale and cook for 30 seconds.
5. Add salt, garlic, lemon juice, coconut aminos, and toss to coat. (Continue tossing mixture until kale is wilted, about 2 minutes; Taste kale and adjust flavors with a pinch of salt, lemon juice, or coconut aminos).
6. Remove the kale mixture from the heat
7. Serve in a bowl and garnish with toasted almonds. Enjoy!

Health Benefits:

Kale includes the nutrients potassium and fiber. Both have been shown to reduce blood pressure and cholesterol levels leading to improved cardiovascular health. Almonds are high in unsaturated fats which can help cholesterol levels by lowering LDL and increasing HDL.

Almonds are also a great source of fiber to help you feel fuller longer and control blood sugar levels
